Feedback Obtained
<p>Improvements at PMIST for enriching the quality of education and the industry friendly curricula are not only Suo motu but prudently also based on the outcome of the analysis of various feedbacks from the stakeholders and the suggestions put forth in different committees. The feedbacks from the students, teacher, parents, employers, alumini, and subject experts are gathered on multiple parameters, analysed and appropriate suggestions are proposed for implementation. They are collected through judiciously prepared forms as well as at Departmental Advisory Committee and Board of Studies. The forms are subjected to review as per the requirement. The feedback assessment is on the 0-5 scale, in which the score of 4 and less indicates that there is an ample scope for improvement. The critical parameter for feedback assessment are: 1. Sequence and Distribution of Courses 2. Benchmarking of the Syllabus 3. Provisions for Skill Development 4. Consideration for local. national and international needs 5. Including latest and Contemporary topics 6. Provision for Life-Long Learning Nearly seven hundred feedbacks from students, hundred feedbacks from teachers, four hundred feedbacks from alumni, sixty feedbacks from employers and two hundred feedbacks from parents have been collected. The action taken report for all the programmes clearly indicates the importance of feedback in improving the curriculum and syllabus. The feedback by students mostly concentrated on inclusion of courses which cover the latest trends. The students of science stream were interested in relating their syllabus with that of national level tests. The needs were well taken by the department and implemented in the successive revisions. Courses which are of emerging trends are offered immediately as a value added course. Alumni feedback suggested in including specific courses for some programmes. Those programmes are added during the syllabus revision. Analysis and action taken on the feedbacks resulted in the implementation of the following improvements at PMIST: • Value</p>

Added Programmes had reached to 18 that introduce latest trends and enhance the chances of placement. • The students were exposed to plenty of Field Projects (330 students were involved), Inplant Training/Internship (1113 students have undergone) and Industrial Visits (666 students participated). • Faculties were subjected to FDP and Seminars that enriches their knowledge and skill. • New books were added to library based on the feedback on text and reference books. • Journals and data bases already available in the library were extended to compliment the research component of the curricula • Students were involved in the Innovation activities including taking part in the National and Institutional Innovation Centres/Cells. The implemented feedbacks were highly appreciated by the students in general and by the concerned stakeholders in particular.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

PMIST has got a robust Mentoring system right from its inception as Periyar Maniammai College of Technology for Women in 1984, much before it became a Deemed University. It is a multi-layered and multi-directional approach, yet not a cascading one. Nominated Mentors, Class-in-charges, and appointed Professional counselors provide effective and timely counseling. For that matter, every faculty, as de-facto mentors addresses the problems of the students whenever they approach them. All the UG and PG students are assigned with a mentor for their entire stay at PMIST. A mentor may have maximum of 20 students, the limit is decided by the faculty availability in the department. When the faculty strength is less in a department, faculty members of humanities and sciences are allotted for mentoring the first year students. Head of the Department allot the mentor for the students when she/he joins the institutions. Weekly once mentor meets the students. Timetable includes specific mentoring hour for the departments' mentor- students meeting. Details of students are recorded in hard copy. Role of the Mentor

1. Call a meeting of all students at the beginning of the semester and record their details.
2. Maintain a record of the students' progress, identify issues if any with respect to the academic or personal issues and solve the issues identified.
3. The mentor shall identify the need for professional help and bring them to the attention of the professional counselor.

Responsibilities of the students

1. To attend the meetings regularly.
2. To give accurate and complete information at the time of joining the mentor-students programme.
3. To provide details to the mentor whenever asked for.
4. To repose confidence in the mentor and ask for help and advice as needed.

Class-in-Charges A faculty is designated as a Class-in-charge for every class of all the programmes who acts as a mentor as well. He/She is in constant touch with his/her class students and their parents. This continuous monitoring minimizes/eliminates any unpleasant events since timely counseling and corrective/preventive measures are contemplated in time.

Professional Counselor If a student needs persistent and sustained expert counseling then the Professional Counselor appointed by/at PMIST provides appropriate and effective psychological and other form of counseling. The students might directly on their own or through and with the mentors/ class-in-charges can approach the professional counselor for the help. Even friends and parents can approach the professional counselor for the benefit of the student in need.

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5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

In line with the UGC directions, recommendations of Lyngdoh Committee Report and the orders of the Honourable Supreme Court of India, PMIST conducts elections for the members of the students' council. It is conducted in a transparent manner during August, every year. Performances in Academic, Curricular, Co-curricular, Extra-curricular and other activities form the basis for the eligibility to contest. Class representative are elected as council members from among the eligible contestants. They in turn elect the chairman and other office bearers of the council. Both the genders are represented in the IQAC with the induction of the Chairperson and another member of the council, as a fair representation. The Functions of various bodies wherein students are represented:

- Students Council functions as a bridge between institute and students. It supports in conducting the events in the campus like Periyar Annual Cultural Events (PEACE), Annual sports meet, Open House exhibitions, Science Day and Students symposium etc. Institution funds the Students Council in organizing all the events and meetings.
- Anti-ragging committee comprises three student members representing First year, Second year and Third year. Whenever enquiry related to Ragging is conducted, the Anti Ragging committee members play a crucial role while representing student community.
- Each department has got its own students association which helps the students to actively participate and organize various events. To mention a few departments and events: Architecture dept,-FoPears, EEE dept.-Synergy, Civil dept.-Civil Engineering Student Association, Commerce dept.-Commerce Association.
- In IQAC meetings the student representative acts as the voice of the students. They also get exposed to the first hand understanding of the mechanism of the management/ administration of the institution.

PMIST is being governed by an independent non-profit society/trust with members from various walks of life. The management of this higher educational institute strongly advocates the doctrine of delegation / de-centralization of authority and accountability with appropriate empowerment to the administration. This inclusivity and synergy in the collective management immensely enhances the effectiveness and efficiency of the quality of higher education at PMIST.

However, the following authorities take care of the participative and Decentralized management of PMIST, in accordance with the UGC regulations. The decision/ authority flow is multidirectional i.e. top-down, bottom-up and lateral ones, taking every section / aspect into account. ? Board of Management (BoM) ? Academic Council (AC) ? Planning and Monitoring Board (PMB) ? Finance Committee (FC) ? Board of Studies (BoS) ? IQAC ? Students council ? Quality Circle ? Different committees dealing with the discipline and enforcement of rules and regulations formed under the directives of statutory bodies. The two following practices are detailed: 1. Curriculum / Syllabus / Programme design and development: The curricula, syllabi and even the programmes are designed, developed and inducted into. They are periodically revisited and revised by updating in line with the requirements and demands. The feedbacks from various stakeholders like parents, students, faculties, industrial experts, alumni are gathered, analyzed and adopted for the improvement of the programmes. The suggestions are put forward to Class Advisory Committee and then to, BoS. After detailed study the changes are suggested to the Academic Council and then to Board of Management for review and ratification with or without their own improvements. Then the approved improvements for enriching the syllabi and Curricula are incorporated as revisions. The new programmes recommended are introduced after the approval of the statutory bodies like AICTE/UGC etc. Thus the entire activities of revisiting the curricula development are appropriately decentralized with adequate checks and balances. 2. Active Participation in General Administrative Decision Making Process: The general administrative decisions are carried out in a multi-directional mode- both Top-down and Bottom-up as well as Lateral entity. The HoDs conduct meetings with their faculties and staff for suggestions and means of improvements for enriching and enhancing the quality of education at PMIST. They may include the infrastructure and logistical support requirements. They in turn are referred to the Council of Deans for further study and analysis. The refined requirements are forwarded to the Academic Council and then to BoM for their ratification. As an overall empowerment the faculties and staff are inducted into the following different representatives as a participative management process that is open and transparent with the involvement of every section. take up online courses like MOOC NPTEL, to get additional credits. Further Open Electives are offered to select the subject as they like/want.

Teaching and Learning

The Teaching-Learning process has undergone a total change with the emphasis shifting from "Teacher Centric" to "Student Centric". This shift in orientation has provided faculties to adopt innovative pedagogical approaches for the improvement of the entire learning process. ICT applications in the classrooms has become a routine one now. The self learning from the website and the FDP courses strengthen further the faculties' caliber and ability. Virtual learning like Google Classes and net-based studies inculcate the culture of life-long learning. About 20 of the syllabi are from the e- media and hence, contemporary. Flipped Classrooms, Mind Mapping, Jig saw, Student -Teacher etc., make the teaching-learning conducive, participative and way ahead with time/in tune with time.

Examination and Evaluation

Continuous assessment and general grading in line with the regulations of the statutory bodies are being adopted for the OBE system at PMIST. The questions papers and evaluated answer sheets are vetted by designated external experts, to make the exam system appropriate and effective without any bias or mal-practice. In addition Moderation and Result Passing Boards oversee the efficiency of the evaluation to ensure correctiveness of the system. Further the students are eligible to get photocopy of the answer-scripts for their verification and satisfaction. The marks are entered online with the help of BRAIN software with its own checks and balances. The results are published within 15 days after the end of exams, thus making the entire exam system transparent and error free. Fast-track exams are conducted for the arrears of the outgoing students, so that they are not far behind their classmates. The performances of the students and the effectiveness of the exam system are reviewed in the IQAC meetings for any mid-stream improvements.

Research and Development

PMIST has got a well defined Research

Policy and Regulations in line with that of the UGC guidelines. Similar policy guidelines are also in vogue for the Consultancy and Project Management.

The Research focuses on all the categories like Fundamental, Applied and Project and Experimental Researches. PhD research caters to the part-time and full-time scholars, whereas MPhil allows only full-timers (as per 2016 UGC regulations). To encourage the research scholars seed-money, recognition, and awards for research performance are offered. Bosch Rex lab- an integrated lab facility- was established for the benefit of researcher. Part-time teaching assignments with monetary benefits are offered to encourage "earn while learning". Research Advisory Committee continuously monitors the progress and the research methodology and initiates appropriate improvements. Workshops and lectures are arranged on the latest trends on the research, Intellectual Property Rights and Patents Registration, so that the scholars are well versed with such aspects also. PMIST Innovation Council is a highly rated (2 stars) and recognized unit of MIC by MHRD Cell, which boosts the morale of the researchers to take part in all the events of MIC. Projects and consultancy based researches that would take PMIST to a higher pedestal are also encouraged.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

Library has a robust system of management, well structured with periodical reviews. The library review committee not only revisits the progress but also follows-up the procurement of books and other reading material as recommended by various authorities. It occupies an area of 2620 sq.m in three floors. It contains 91,865 volumes of books, 3,626 back-volumes, 1,678 CDs and 182 Videos. It has subscribed to 308 National, International Journals, e-journals and e-databases. It is a member of DELNET, British Council Library, and Tamil University Thanjavur Library. It also has an inter library loan facility amongst the member libraries. It also uses BRAIN software for its administration through e-governing. Wi-Fi and internet facilities are available at the library.

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

Best Practice 1 Innovation and Startup Entrepreneurship: Context: Modern trendy approach of the higher education institutes around the world is innovation and startups, which provide the impetus for growth and a must even for the very sustenance. PMIST is not far behind in realizing this fact and follows the innovation and startup as two barreled gun for survival and expansion. Accordingly, the institution provides all that are needed for active innovation through research. The very Motto of PMIST - Think, Innovate, Reform - reflects the culture of converting the ideas into need based projects that uplift the standard of the society by enriching the quality of life. In order to achieve the promotion of innovation among the students, PMIST has started Institution Innovation Cell (IIC) as per the directions of MHRD. The PMIST IIC encourages and helps the students to work with new and innovative ideas through seminars/ workshops on innovative and entrepreneurship processes and activities.

Objectives : ? To explore, encourage, and ensure that the right environment for converting the creative thinking/ ideas into innovations are provided and persisted ? To envisage that the research, consultancy and project execution enhances the avenues for more and more focused on innovations ? To envision that the innovative creations result into society based entrepreneurship ? To enable that the innovations lead to startup businesses providing more employments ? To establish Institute Innovation Cell (IIC) as contemplated by MHRD to institutionalize the innovation process. To enlist the IIC with the MHRD's Innovation Cell (MIC) for nationalize and standardize the process. To register with the Atal Ranking of Institutions on Innovation Achievement (ARIIA) that helps to establish startups. To associate with MIC and ARIIA continuously for expanding the areas of innovative research with their support and exposure to other similar institutes

Process: As per the directions PMIST's IIC has registered with MHRD' MIC on 21 November 2018 with the number IC 201810657. This provides an opportunity to take part in the programmes and events of MIC that shape and fine tune the innovation Process. They address and assist with various programmes such as Smart India Hackathon, National Student Startup Policy, Atal Ranking of Institution as on Innovation Achievements and in setting up IICs etc. PMIST IIC is headed by the President, the head of the institute (VC), two senior faculty members and 15 students along with an expert in IPR, CEO of Periyar Technology Business Incubator and an Industrialist. IIC conducts/ organizes workshops, seminars, and interactive sessions with industrialists, entrepreneurs, investors etc. IIC also provides a mentor pool for the innovators. In addition to the faculties and students the research scholars also participate in MIC, AICTE and MHRD sponsored / conducted programmes. Disease spreading avoidance system

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: To enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of these bodies (IIC, MIC ARIIA) the following areas of improvements could be addressed to: Centralized programmes like leadership talk could be fine tuned to make it

better and more successful. The language of the talk should be English so that it is universally benefited. Motivation of the students for innovation should be more aggressive and concerted. Additional Incentives for more IICs could be an encouragement factor. IICs programmes could be tagged together with that of

MIC ones. Increasing the number of competitive events would motivate the innovators. Evidence of Success: Five hundred students, research scholars and faculties participated in various programmes and events. Students have the opportunity of listening to the talks of great leaders. Innovating thinking has been gradually inculcated among the student community. Students have developed the habit of asking questions, which require groundwork preparation beforehand.

Due to this sustained efforts the Startups and Incubates will build up in number in the near future. Innovation developments in local ecosystem are gradually entering and increasing at the Institute. PMIST was awarded two stars because of substantial activities of IIC. It is a long journey in which PMIST is at the threshold / starting. Best Practice II Extensive Adoption to MOOC Courses This is an era of net age with/and netizens. Everyone for everything relies on e-based activities. This applies to knowledge acquisition as well. The students and the faculties both not only seek but also enlarge and enrich

knowledge by continuously expanding the networks. Hence, it becomes an imperative and compulsion without an option, to provide and facilitate e-learning and e-teaching. This alone would transform the orthodox teacher oriented teaching to student centric teaching learning. It is all the more important for Choice Based (Credit) Education System with Credit and Outcome

Based Courses having continuous evaluation of meeting the outcomes contemplated. Accordingly PMIST encourages the faculties and students, the extensive adoption and use of MOOC's free and paid online courses. This provides immense opportunities for the students to opt for any number of courses out of many offered/available ones. They have to only approach an appropriate website like www.udemy.com for the right information for learning from anywhere at any time. Objectives of Extensive Adoption to MOOC Courses as a Best Practice are: To expose the students/teachers to the current and additional courses available. To enlarge their knowledge domain with the vast and up to date knowledge that would enhance their self confidence and self esteem. To expand and enrich their self study skill, attitude with independent approach. To experiment/explore with modern ICT tools/ hardware and software during this study. To synergize and synchronize the teaching learning processes cementing the teacher and the students that would create a strong bond and

strengthen the good rapport between them. The Practice: The Most of the students of PMIST are from rural background and from Tamil Medium schools. Hence, the adoption of MOOC courses is concentrated on the English based ones. Since, they are wards of the poor agriculturists free courses are suggested first, instead of the ones with a fee. The students are advised to complete three courses first before going for five courses. This is to have a level playing between the slow and fast learners. These Language courses would enlarge and enrich their listening, speaking, reading and writing skills in English. Students not having laptops are advised and encouraged to download and install apps onto their mobile cells, tablets and PC, so that they learn the courses at their own time and place. They are asked to make notes of the lessons for effective participation during interactive discussions with the peers about the courses they had selected/ completed. Incidentally this would help the teacher in assessing whether the student is attentive and listening during the video lecturing. The understanding and grasp of the subject also could be evaluated from it. At the end Certificates are provided to the successful/completed students. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: However, the following

constraints are to be tackled with adequate resources for the effective implementation and success of adoption of MOOC courses: Since the students are from rural areas they are not quite familiar with online courses. Hence, Laptops/Tablets/ PCs/ Smart Phones with internet facilities might be provided

to them to overcome the handicap of ICT usage. Quite often the network becomes an impediment for smooth operation. That needs to be addressed properly and set right for enabling the students to complete the courses in time. Slow learners drag the moving bar of each video lecture so as to complete it without listening to it fully. Such students have to be properly instructed and monitored to learn the courses in total. ? Some students could not identify the Filter option in mobile. They are to be Filtering Free Courses in the website.

Accent and pronunciation are difficult to comprehend for some students.

Subtitles could be attempted to. They might be provided with earphones for listening to the video lectures for privacy and flexibility of operation at their convenience. Evidence of Success: The usage/adoption of MOOC courses had enriched and enlarged the learning process of the students with improvements as listed below: The interest in acquiring additional knowledge through network has increased. The learning of extended courses elated them and put them on an elevated pedestal. They are motivated to learn more and more online courses related to their major subjects. The respect of and confidence on the teacher have enhanced and they become mutual between students and teachers. The Certificate provided has boosted their respect in the family and society. The extended study of MOOC courses has nurtured them for disciplined and structured academic performance. As a result the pass percentage of the students has improved with less failures and arrears. They have developed the basic norms and etiquettes of questioning and discussions. In short they are thrilled to learn the subjects of their choice at their will at any place and at any time they choose.

Institution is committed to a green policy which includes activities like landscaping and vegetation, water conservation, energy conservation, waste management and green building materials like flyash bricks. ? Institution aims to achieve Zero Carbon Footprint by 2025. One of the ways identified for achieving this goal is reduction of wastage in energy and increasing the use of renewable energy. ? Consumption of energy, water and waste water qualities are continuously monitored by a team of faculty and students. Ways to reduce energy usage are discussed. Promising ideas are implemented subsequently. ? Institution has published a booklet called GREEN PRACTICES IN PMU TOWARDS ZERO CARBON BY 2025 to create awareness among faculty and students. Institution practices Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Refuse and Recover philosophy in all its activities. Colour coded bins are used in the entire campus to segregate the solid waste. ? Two student clubs namely Energy Club and Environment Club along with the centre for climate change conduct awareness programs periodically among students and the public about energy conservation, water conservation, tree plantation and solid waste management. ? Use of motor vehicles is restricted inside the campus. All are motivated to use bicycles inside. This reduces pollution in the total area of the Institute. ? Institution continuously increases its green cover by planting trees. Every year tree saplings are planted by the newly admitted students of that academic year and also by the guests. All pervasive greenery on the sprawling premises of the institute symbolizes the institutions success in countering environmental pollution and creating Eco friendliness. Greenery and vegetation are maintained all over the campus. ? The campus has around 4,500 shrubs and plant varieties, 36,820 native trees and endangered trees. Such thick foliage

of vegetation absorbs CO2 emission around 3.66,750 tonnes per annum. Varieties of species and medicinal plants have been produced with the help of Tissue Culture (TC) techniques and quality seedlings produced by TC plant hardening centre. ? Rainwater as runoff is collected on ground surface in the camps is fed into the collecting sumps and natural ponds located in four different places of the institute using recharge trenches of 3 nos having length of 300m and depth of 1.5m. ? The rainwater thus harvested and collected in the sumps is directly used as irrigation water for lawns by suitable sprinklers in the campus of about 40,000 litres per day and for vegetable farms by drip irrigation of about 2,50,000 litres per day. The recharged groundwater through deep bore well is utilized for all institutional needs and construction of buildings. ? Creating awareness among the public and student about solid waste management. So far 80000 people and students from School were given awareness and 120 programmes were conducted. ? Institution has constructed 480 modular eco toilets in Pillayarpatti village. ? Solid Waste Management Training under Nirmal Bharath Abhiyan Scheme were given to 480 Panchayat Presidents, Overseers, Block Development Officers, Assistant Engineers, etc. of District Rural Development Agency (DRDA), Thanjavur District
